How *The Move This* Impacts Students:

The Move This builds active listening, cooperation, and effective communication. Students pass the "Move This" beat around in a circle, requiring them to listen carefully and follow along. Students are encouraged to make eye contact with their peers as they continually pass the beat around the circle, as well as celebrate when they make a mistake. The Move This is fun, upbeat, and a great chance for students to connect with every member of the class at once.
