When Communities Make Mistakes

We all make mistakes. Individuals, families, communities, and even nations make mistakes! What is most important is that we all take responsibility for our actions. If we've made a mistake, or have acted in some way that we regret, we can admit what we've done is wrong, apologize, then offer to make amends. Families, communities, and nations can do this too. Discuss with your class why it is important not just for individuals to take responsibility for their actions, but also for larger communities, such as nations, to take responsibility for their actions. For example, many countries border the Pacific Ocean. What would happen if one country dumped its garbage into the ocean? How would this affect the other countries that border that ocean? How would it affect the life in the ocean? What should the country that dumped the garbage in the ocean do?
