

Utah's Portrait of a Graduate and DESSA Crosswalk

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Utah's [Portrait of a Graduate](#) identifies the ideal characteristics of a Utah graduate after going through the K-12 system. These characteristics begin at home and are cultivated in educational settings. The competencies are grouped into the acronym MAP: Mastery competencies, Autonomy competencies, and Purpose competencies.

The DESSA suite of assessments measures key social and emotional competencies essential for student success now and into the future. The DESSA assessments span kindergarten through 12th grade and can be completed by educators, students, and parents or guardians. The assessments are nationally standardized, norm-referenced, strength-based behavior rating scales, measuring the positive skills, behaviors, and mindsets necessary for students to thrive.

This crosswalk highlights the alignment between Utah's Portrait of a Graduate and the DESSA assessment items. It shows how the DESSA assessments can help ensure that all Utah students achieve the skills and mindsets needed to be successful graduates and community members.
