Wyoming Profile of a Graduate and DESSA Crosswalk

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The Wyoming Profile of a Graduate articulates the knowledge, skills, and mindsets students need to thrive after graduation; establishes a North Star for state and local policies; and creates a strongly aligned educational system for Wyoming.

The DESSA suite of assessments measures key social and emotional competencies essential for student success now and into the future. The DESSA assessments span K-12 and can be completed by educators, students, and parents or guardians. The assessments are nationally standardized, norm-referenced, strength-based behavior rating scales, measuring the positive skills and mindsets necessary for students to thrive.

This crosswalk highlights the alignment between the Wyoming Profile of a Graduate and the DESSA assessment items, and demonstrates how the DESSA assessments can be used by districts and schools to ensure every student has the skills and mindsets needed as an ideal Wyoming graduate.
